Chicago wa is knowledgeble on reparations and Hayakawa is not an issue there. LA is hard on wa anti-Hayakawa sentiment, and Tricia worked there the story. SF is afraid of Hayakawa and the Japanese redevelopment monied interests that supported Hayakawa, on the one at side, and the home of the JACL headquarters on the other, interest the Mas Satow Memorial Hospital. Seattle is redress central, and Dave Horsey we owe a favort. The Portland is Alan Ota's territory, us and him vs. his editor Richard Nokes.

National media: we have the girlmat AP working her story and freelancing to the NY Times. The NBC affil in DC wants us to telephone-debate Hayakawa. The newspmagagines are still an cold to the issue. Unitl we submit a bill we have to basis there. The Post is fative following the story but won't catch up with us to until the Pomona event. ABC has yet to use their Puyallup man footage. The guard tower is still a possibility. The intellectuals a magazines have no to the writer working a sak story for them we know. Karamana Karen and I could start working on the story from the inside. Is But as for the open letter: no network, no radio network, lotta local to coverage, and still potential of the wire service and Kya Hayakawa's response giving us another day of play.

JAPANESE AMERICANS BREAK THERTY SEVEN YEARS OF SILENCE

Japanese Americans interested in pursiting a more active campaign.

KNX: Today Japanese Americans all over the nation have broken to keep the what they call 37 years of self-imposed silence by taking out a paid ad in the Washington Post. The ad was in the form of an open letter to California Senator SI Hayakawa, critical of his characterization of Japanese Americans as a people who came through WWII unscathed. Actor I George Takei who was interned as young man, read the lettert to Senator hayakawa. . "You were not here with us in camps..." The letter went on to say, barbed wire etc made them concentration camps. Meanwhile, efforts in Seattle are continuing to get a bill passed through the Congress for financial reparations for those Japanese Americans who were interned from 1942 to 1952. --Mal Adams.

Well Jeff, Senator Hayakawa statements about the relocations camps have angered many Japanese Americans. Today a group calledgethe itself the Days of Remembrance took out an ad in the Washington Post, an open letter signed by 2000 Japanese Americans protesting Hayakawa's proposition. Here In Los Angeles committee spokemen talked about their frustration in dealing with Senator hayakawa. That happened at a news conference at the Old Union Church in Little Tokyo and the site of one of one of the assembly centers set up on this day 37 years ago by the U.S. Army, that was part of the full evacuation of all Japanese Americans from the West Coast. Speakers included Members of the M highly Maxanakawa decorated 442nd Combat Team and former internees of the relocation camps....

"You, Senator Hayakawa, were not here with was us on the West Coast... They were concentration camps....."
"From an obscure Canadian immigrant....."

(cut to) Ashley somebody: "Senator Hayakawa has always astated that the camps were an unjust act of the Ameirican government. He fully understands there was discrimination. He fully understands at there was suffering at that time. But simply, in 1942 the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, the first time American was ever attacked on its shores. Indeed, There was panic, there was confusion, there were unjust acts that followed."

George: "...really boils wat our blood town have that brought up again, at this point, reinforcing again those myths that Senator Hayakawa persists in, and that ignorance, that interest in it is a Canadian vantage point, was I must say, on this. He says he plans to publish his own open letter, talking about the groups own moral insensitivity. The axi Japanese American groups meanwhile say they are going to continue to press for legislative redress for the time they spent behind barbed wire. ---Tricia Toyota
