Dear Frank:

May 22, 1944 through the regular mail I have sent you a copy of my hearing in this camp. In that letter if you recall, I wrote I see no reason why we can not co-operate with the U.S. Department of Justice. And I see no wrong in the fpc proceeding by which we demand and enforced our rights in the court of justice. Even though the half official deny me of my four freedom I shall practise the elementary principle of democracy rather than to preach.

Project attorney of this camp has send me a notice to come to his office three times and yesterday he send an errand boy for me to come to his office and I have flatly refused to comply with this administration. Only thing I shall follow when the administrative staff use might. It is undemocratic but one never can predict the mind of the white trashes. I am prepared.

My hearing lasted for two full day and he finally broke down and he showed me the hearing of the Heart Mountain nrlc. I noticed most of the fellows has given the written statement of the history of the fpc. They were very frank in their answers.

P.S. Nobu Kawai, Yonemura and Konduta have spoke against the fpc. Their confession are heavy.

I also made a written statement in addition to others:Quote,

I should also like to state that complete records were always maintained of the activities, memberships and funds collected by the fpc. committee. There are records available showing the exact amounts and also the names of the individuals who contributed to the fpc. These records are open for the examination.

And a mimeograph machine was also obtained by the member of the fpc. The mimeograph machine which was used by myself and other member of the fpc. for the publication of the bulletins is in the possession of the Mr. Aso. However, Mr. Aso had no knowledge as to what the machine was to be used for.

In accordance with and authorized by the constitution of the state your fellows are conforming to justice. Stick by it until dooms day.

For myself I have given little rope to hang myself but and I am confident that the fpc. is not subversive committee.

Be assured that I am hundred percent with you fellows. ACLU has wrote to use that the third edition is not so good.

Today I received a letter from the administration that I am cleared to leave this camp so come to the office and sign a clearance paper. I have notified the ACLU attorney and I shall not do anything about it until I hear from him.

Give my best regard to all. I have fulfill this matter
as directed.
