

### POLICE SURVEY DELAY IS ASKED

The impending "modernization" survey of the Seattle Police Department "should be delayed a little longer" to permit completion of the Krenl plan of traffic control, Chief Herbert D. Kimsey told the City Council yesterday.

In asking delay of the Council-approved survey, which would be made by August Vollmer, former Berkeley, Calif., police chief and a police administration authority, Kimsey joined the stand previously taken by Mayor William F. Devin.

Mayor Devin has suggested the reorganization move be undertaken temporarily to give the department time to get the Krenl system operating effectively and to leave its vice-suppression efforts unhampered.

The chief requested the delay in a letter to Councilman David Levine. The councilman had asked the chief how long it would take to compile the mass of preliminary data and background material. Vollmer had informed the Council he would need before the survey could be started.

Vollmer already has agreed to make the survey for a fee of \$100 a day, plus expenses, but the Council has not yet hired him.

### WILSON WARNS OF HARD YEAR

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Charles E. Wilson, executive vice chairman of the War Production Board, said today the volume of material shipped for the invasion of North Africa and Italy was "insignificant" compared with the job ahead of equipping General Eisenhower's all-out assault on Europe.

"I am sure in my heart—as I think most of you are—that the Germans will be smashed, I believe in 1944," Wilson told a meeting of executives of W. P. B.'s office of operations.

"I will pray with you that the Germans will break . . . I'll pray but I can't count on it and I know the military people don't count on it."

Wilson told the W. P. B. officials that the year ahead would be the most difficult of the war for them. Civilian goods must be increased, he said, but "by comparison with the No. 1 job—supplying the armed forces—it is unimportant."

"I needn't remind you that the volume of munitions war material produced in 1944 is greater than in 1943—or at least equal if you give credence to cutbacks reported to be coming later."

Wilson said that the 9,000 planes being produced this month, including hundreds of heavy bombers, "just isn't enough for the job that is ahead."

### A. M. G. Seeks To Halt Typhus Fever in Naples

NAPLES, Dec. 29.—(AP)—A. M. G. medical officers, waging an intensive campaign against typhus fever in Naples, have called meetings of all civilian physicians to speed identification of cases so the patients can be isolated.

Naples doctors will be made as familiar as possible with signs of the disease. Once a case is diagnosed and the patient taken to a hospital, A. M. G. opens an anti-typhus campaign on his family, all persons living in the same building and all those with whom the patient is known to have been in contact.

Typhus is carried from person to person only by body lice and killing lice is the quickest way to check it.

A. M. G. medical officers regard the epidemic as serious, so far as the civilian population is concerned—but not a menace to Allied troops. There has not yet been one case among troops.

Up to Christmas, there were 250 cases of typhus among Neapolitans. Since Christmas, 52 new cases have been reported.

About 25 per cent of the cases have resulted in death.

George Washington Smith, 80 years old, father of Mrs. Hutchinson, died of a heart attack. Shortly after returning from funeral services for Smith, Shade Hutchinson, 65-year-old father of Mr. Hutchinson, died of a stroke.

### JAP INTERNEES TREATED WELL

—Says Spanish Report.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The Examiner said today Spanish government assurances that Japanese internees in the United States are being given civilized treatment are en route to the Japanese government.

The report to Japan, the paper said, is being cleared through the Spanish embassy in Washington, D. C., and is based on an investigation of Japanese relocation centers in this country.

The investigation extended over a period of several months and was conducted by representatives of the Spanish government in behalf of and at the request of the Japanese government.

The segregation center at Tule Lake, Calif., where 16,000 disloyal internees rioted November 1 and the United States Army subsequently took control, was included in the report.

The report, The Examiner said, "declares in clear, precise terms that the Japanese at Tule Lake and four other relocation centers for Japanese are receiving a generous sufficiency of food; that sanitation facilities, including light and recreation, are 'excellent'; that, in effect, all five camps are characterized by 'favorable' conditions."

The Army was credited with giving the same "favorable" treatment to the Japanese at Tule Lake as the War Relocation Authority, formerly in charge there, but it was said Army control was "firmer."

### Hirabayashi Hitch-Hiked To Arizona Camp

The three-month sentence Gordon Kiyoshi Hirabayashi received more than a year ago from United States District Judge Lloyd L. Black, after being convicted of violating Japanese curfew regulations here, was served this fall in a prison camp near Tucson, Ariz.

Hirabayashi, Auburn-born University of Washington senior, who challenged the evacuation of Japanese by going to trial, was compelled to hitch-hike to the camp, according to an article in the weekly publication of evacuees at Heart Mountain, Wyo. The paper reported that Hirabayashi had finished his term December 6 and was discharged to rejoin his family in Idaho.

When his conviction was upheld by the United States Supreme Court last June, Hirabayashi was working in Spokane for the American Friends Service Committee and the War Relocation Authority. He was given a choice between the Spokane County jail and the Arizona camp, and, in choosing the latter, was to provide his own transportation, which turned out to be hitch-hiking.

Friends here who received letters from him while he was hitch-hiking the 1,600 miles from Spokane to Tucson, said Hirabayashi had not been expected at the camp and had to tell the authorities who he was. He will continue his work for the committee and War Relocation Authority in Spokane.

### Steel Production Returns to Normal

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Steel production climbed back toward normal today after a work stoppage by more than 170,000 workers while the United Steel Workers' Union continued negotiations for new contracts.

Over the nine states affected by work tie-ups which began with expiration of contracts on Christmas Eve, Congress of Industrial Organizations workers returned to their jobs with the start of regular shifts or in accordance with operating conditions. The American Iron & Steel Institute estimated the strike cost the industry about 125,000 tons of steel production.

### WHISKEY PRICE CHANGE UNLIKELY

There is little likelihood that Washington State whiskey prices will be reduced substantially as a result of the Office of Price Administration ruling which imposes ceilings at the processor level on all domestic distilled spirits, Evro M. Becket, State Liquor Control Board chairman, said today.

"Washington and other monopoly states have been buying liquor at prices considerably below those available to the 'open' states," Becket declared. "Consequently, we already are receiving much of the benefit the ceilings will provide."

"We have as yet received no direct word regarding the repricing of liquor at the distilleries, and cannot say which brands will be affected or what the reductions, if any, will amount to."

The processor ceilings become effective January 6. Retailers and wholesalers already operate under fixed mark-ups set last summer.
